NED KAHN

<u>Ned Kahn</u> is an environmental artist and sculptor, famous in particular for museum exhibits he has built for the Exploratorium in San Francisco. His works usually involve capturing an invisible aspect of nature and making it visible; examples include building facades that move in waves in response to wind and indoor tornadoes and vortices made of fog, steam, or fire. Kahn won a MacArthur Foundation "genius grant" fellowship in 2003 and the National Design Award for environmental design in 2005.

In November, 2003, Ned Kahn created a site-specific sculpture for di Rosa. Entitled *Wind House*, the shimmering sculpture consists of four walls composed of thousands of small, anodized aluminum panels hinged to move freely in the wind. The piece creates the gossamer suggestion of a building, changing moment to moment. More of Kahn's weather-related works such as *Cloud Rings* are on view in the Gatehouse Gallery.

CATHERINE WAGNER

<u>Catherine Wagner</u> is an artist who photographs the backdrop of our lives, from detailed black and white images of microscopic cell structures to our architectural environment. Most recently, Wagner has concentrated her work on ideas relating to the intersection of Art and Science. She has received many major awards, including the inaugural Visual Arts Fellowship from the San Jose Museum of Art, a Guggenheim Fellowship, NEA Fellowships, and the Ferguson Award.





Wagner's photographs have served to record the world around us in ways that make the ordinary suddenly appear infused with mystery and wonder. Among her photographs in the di Rosa collection is an image of a 7th grade science classroom devoid of human figures, that focuses instead on the conscious and unconscious details of public spaces that most reveal aspects of those who dwell within them.
